

*Law degrees.*—The degree of Doctor of Law (J.D.) is conferred upon candidates therefor who are college graduates and have completed the professional course with an average standing 10 per cent above the passing mark. Law credit obtained by examinations taken before a student has taken 24 majors of college work will not be counted toward this degree.

The degree of Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) is conferred upon candidates therefor who have completed the professional course with an average standing 10 per cent above the passing mark.

To obtain either of the professional degrees it is necessary to complete 27 majors of law work, distributed over nine quarters of law-school residence, of which at least 9 majors of work and three quarters of residence (including the last quarter for which credit is given) must have been at this School and not counted toward a law degree elsewhere. The work of the first year and the practice courses are required.

Candidates for either of the professional degrees who complete the course with high distinction will receive the degree *cum laude*.

No professional degree will be conferred upon any student markedly deficient in English, and no student may receive both a first academic and a professional degree in the same quarter.
